U. S. Forest Service Trail Update

Here at the Forest Service, 2015 looks to be another busy year on the Maah Daah Hey (MDH). We have already submitted an application for the North Dakota Recreational Trails Program (RTP) Grant this winter. We applied for funding to continue surfacing the southern extension of the MDH for 4.7 miles from Mile Post (MP) 3-8.5. We also applied for restoration of the MDH for 17 miles from MP 20.5 to 37.5. If approved the work will begin on these two projects as early as the summer of 2016 and be contracted with the already approved surfacing from MP 8.5-15.

As I write this we have a solicitation open for bids for a contract that will begin work the summer of 2015. This contract includes RTP funding to surface 4.6 miles of the south section from MP 15-19.5 and to restore miles 75-80 on the MDH, a majority of the Long X and all of the Bennett trails. This restoration will help with a number of rough spots on these sections of trail. Also, in this contract the Forest Service will be funding construction for the reroutes east of Devils Pass and just north of County Road 50. The reroute east of Devils Pass, which was moved because of the installation of a gas pipeline, has already been posted, cleared and mowed. The reroute North of County Road 50, which was moved due to a large series of slumps, has been flagged and is awaiting completion of the environmental assessment. All of these projects are scheduled to be completed in 2015. We will also be completing a contract for surfacing almost 3 miles of the south section from MP 19.5-22.5. This should be completed by early summer.

We would like to thank Nick Ybarra, Dakota Cyclery, and all of the volunteers for the help they provided on the trail last summer by logging over 600 hours of trail maintenance. They had our three trail mowers working overtime. After last season one of the three will be retired as a parts mower and another may be on its way out. We will be purchasing three new mowers for this summer, of which two are being funded by RTP. Hopefully this will result in not only more mowers available, but more reliable mowers.

Our hiring process for seasonal trail crew is underway. The application period closed in early February

and we are currently waiting for the list of qualified applicants. We have one returning crew member and hope to hire four new seasonals which will make six counting myself.

We have faced three main hiring obstacles in the last few years. The first obstacle is the change in process for hiring that took place initially in 2013. We can now only accept applications through usajobs.gov and this application period has been moved to an earlier time period which is before many of our target audience begin to look for summer employment. This new system has had many growing pains and has provided challenges in hiring seasonals the last few years. The second obstacle has been pay. When I began working on the trail in the summer of 2008 this was one of the better paying summer jobs for a college student. We are no longer competitive because we can only pay between \$11-14 per hour under the federal pay scale. The third obstacle has been lack of housing for those willing to come and work to gain experience with the Forest Service. In 2014, we had hundreds of applicants, but after learning of the housing situation our list was narrowed to under 30 and of those only a handful had plans for housing. By the time we were able to make job offers; those interested had taken other jobs. This year we worked on the parts of the process where we have flexibility. We have also tried to recruit more local applicants that are interested in doing the job for more than just the paycheck. We have also begun constructing government housing that will allow seasonals a place to live at a reasonable rate.

In closing, I am hoping for a spring that does not provide the extended and excessive amounts of moisture that lead to major trail damage.
