President's Message

Hello to Trail users:

Spring has passed and summer is upon us, and everyone is very happy to see some warmer temps and some scattered rain showers, maybe not so much the rain. The rain makes the unsurfaced portions of the MDH trail very difficult to use, if not impassable, but we are working on that situation... **MDHTA** was successful in obtaining our first **RTP grant** to surface two miles of trail around Sully Creek State Park. We will be responsible for 20% of the \$55,000 grant. This 20% share can be either volunteer work days or cash in hand. So keep in tune for these work days or just donate to the cause.

Next I would like to recognize our membership and especially our newest Life members – Mark Zimmerman and Gerard and Mary Kay Baker, and Greg and Michele Gunderson. A big THANK YOU to all our new members and all who renewed their memberships, it is you folks that make the organization run and accomplish what we do as an organization. Please check the date on the Turtle tracks for your membership renewal anniversary.

We have received two benches supplied by the REC **Roundup grant** prepared by **Rod Mitzel**, from last January; they will be installed this summer at Wannagon and Elk Horn trailheads. This project is getting closer to completion as we get donations for the benches, only three to go to complete one at each trailhead on the MDH. **Roger and Pat Ashley and Mark Zimmerman** along with other volunteers have placed numerous turtle signs on the MDH posts and kept up clearing along the way on 7 miles of trail so far this season. **Bruce Bishop** continues to clean up the water caches for the trail users. **Bruce** also handles our very successful **MDH Challenge**, so get involved and see how many miles you can log this season on the MDH trail.

Thanks to **Roger Ashley**, we have answered many email requests for information and have filled over 109 orders since January. The big items besides the new 2018 version of the MDH trail map (102 sent) are water bottles and MDH trail T-shirts and caps.

There was quite a spread in the **North Dakota Horizons** magazine this spring on the MDH trail and the **volunteers** keeping the trail mowed and clearing minor slumps, etc. Way to go, **Save the MDH!!!**

We held our Annual meeting in Dickinson at the Eagles, had another good turnout, a very good meal, and listened to the "Bat Dr", Dr. Paul Barnhart of DSU, give a lively presentation on "Bats in the Badlands"; Roger Ashley went over the fastest known time MDH 144 mile trail run by **Ben Love**. The silent auction was a success, thanks to all the folks who donated items for the auction. The membership changed the Bylaws to allow for more Board members, we now can have at least five but not over seven Board members. Then we elected Jesse Hanson (3 yr term), Nathaniel Bishop, and Brent McCluskey (2 year terms) to the Board. Congrats and welcome aboard!! You will hear more from them later in the TT. Thanks much for the service of Rod Mitzel and Bruce Bishop on the Board. We are still looking for a **Treasurer**; please let a Board member know if you or you know someone (Continued on page 2)

Forest Service Update

Greetings Turtle Tracks readers, I am happy to report that a busy and productive season is upon us. The Dakota Prairie Grasslands Trails Program is in full swing maintaining and improving numerous trails, including the Maah Daah Hey National Recreation Trail. I will report on accomplished, current, and planned projects for our 2019 season.

There are three new recruits on the DPG Trails Crew this season. They have been hard at work mowing, brushing, and performing various trails tasks across the Dakota Prairie Grasslands.

The Forest Service, with assistance from volunteers, has finished the rehabilitation of Wannagan Trailhead and construction of Wannagan Spur Trail. I recommend that members of the public that wish to access the MDHT in this area make use of Wannagan Trailhead instead of Wannagan Campground. This will help to increase the solitude of the camp. Also, please make use of the spur trail and avoid using FS road 726 to access the MDHT. The increasing amount of vehicles and trail users on the road can make for a hazardous situation.

DPG Trails Crew has also, in an effort to increase safety, replaced aging trail crossing signs at multiple road crossings. We ask that members of the public use our Trailheads and do not park or unload along roadsides to access trail.

The Montana Conservation Corps and the Forest Service put our participating agreement to work this season with a nine day hitch on the MDHT. Twenty-three miles of trail were maintained in the areas between Sully Creek State Park and Tom's Wash Trailhead.

Currently, the Forest Service is engaged in multiple projects relating to trails and trail access. Trail restoration on the Maah Daah Hey in the Magpie and Ice Caves areas is displaying tremendous results. This eighteen mile restoration project is expected to be completed by the end of August 2019. We have also been hard at work refurbishing our kiosks at Trailheads and Campgrounds. By seasons end the project will be completed. Members of the public will benefit from the prominently displayed information. This will include a detailed map and trail information and regulations.

Our Dakota Prairie Grasslands Trails Crew continues to work hard maintaining over 250 miles of trail on three National Grasslands. I would like to thank all of you who call or email in to report downed trees, landslides, sinkholes, etc. Also, many thanks to all the members of the public who volunteer their time, hard work, and expertise to improve your trails for everyone.

The Forest Service has multiple projects planned for the end of this season and the next. Hanson Trail will be constructed this fall. This trail will provide access to the Hanson Overlook Point of interest. Soon we will begin survey and design for our 2020 trails prjects. These include the restoration of Cottonwood trail, construction of Sunset Trail, MDHT reroutes, and low water crossings at Blacktail and Andrew's Creeks.

Again, thank you to all of our volunteers. Seeing so many members of the public engaged in their public lands, is a great experience. If you are interested in volunteering please contact your organization or myself directly. Please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions or reports on trail condition. Lastly, good luck to all of those participating in events and trail races this season. Please have a safe season and remember to drink plenty of water!




