President's Message

Hello to trail users:

Spring is upon us, it is 63 degrees as I write this, and some farmers are still combining the 2019 crop. Wow, what a year this has been, and now for the green up and use of the mighty MDH Trail. It is a little soggy as we speak but give it a few weeks and it should be good to go, no ticks yet, but I am sure "they" are waiting just like us to use the TRAIL.

I want to welcome and thank our new life members. Heidi Heitkamp and Darwin Lange of Mandan, ND. We had nine new life members in 2019 and now have 33 Life Members. I have the signs for our Life Member kiosk and will get them up as soon as temperatures stay above 50 degrees. Thank you all very much for those donations. Also, thank you to all the other members that have renewed their membership. If you are wondering if your membership is current, please review the date on your Turtle Tracks address label, which shows your renewal DATE or the email which your Turtle Tracks newsletter is attached to if you receive the letter electronically.

Some updates, we are working with the ND Park and Recreation on our RTP grant for 2020 to gravel surface a couple miles of trail in the Sully Creek State Park area. We are getting all the field wildlife, archeology, and engineering work done, so we can be working there this summer and also holding our Trail Day volunteer event there on June 6, 2020. More on that later. We are ordering two more benches for installation at Magpie and Coal Creek trailheads. We are getting close to having the benches at all the trailheads so you can

sit and rest on your trail adventure. Bruce Bishop is still directing our MDH Challenge so get your accomplishments into him for your badges. **Amy Tysver** is the new person that is helping with our books and treasurer duties, she is very organized and is working to get MDHTA there also. Jesse Hanson is heading up our gate maintenance program, so look to volunteer time when he gets this project off the ground, many gates are in disrepair and just need a little TLC. **Don Mayer** has sold many of the used trail signs from the Forest Service sign replacement contract; see the website for prices and which ones are left. Roger Ashley is heading up the **Trail signage** and **trail** counter, kiosk trail use signup sheet project with the FS. We were not successful for a Roundup REC grant in January but will keep trying, they have been very generous to the MDHTA over the years. We applied for an Eagles grant in February for help with the surfacing share on our RTP grant. We keep the maps sales going and have sent one to almost every state in the nation.

Roger Ashley, Jesse Hanson, and I had a good meeting with FS in February. We discussed many items with them on the MDHTA position on trail projects. Our main item was that we need the FS to agree for the MDHTA to do work with Grants and projects on Forest Service lands. It looks like we will get an agreement to do this, which will allow MDHTA to apply for grants, and programs that we feel we could handle within our group. Others items discussed were trail post signage from MP115 north to the TRNP, bench installation at Magpie and Coal Creek trailheads, work with trail counters and

2020 Maah Daah Hey Challenge

In 2020, the Maah Daah Hey Trail Association (MDHTA) in an effort to encourage hikers, bikers and horse riders to discover, use and enjoy the Maah Daah Hey Trail is offering a 25, 50, 100 and 150 mile trail challenge.

Anyone who hikes, bikes or rides horse 25, 50, 100 or 150 miles on the Maah Daah Hey Trail (MDHT) or on any of its affiliated trails (Buffalo Gap, Long X, Wolf, Aspen, Bennett, Cottonwood, and/or Summit) during calendar year 2020, in aggregate or all at once, will be eligible for a patch. We encourage participants in the challenge to post their pictures and their stories to the Facebook page or send them to the MDHTA so they can be posted to the MDHTA website.

friendly activity saw two 25 mile, four 50 mile, seven 100 mile and five 150 mile patches for a total of 17 patches awarded. Thanks to all who participated. Considering the late summer and fall rains we expect more to participate in 2020.

Forest Service Update

Greetings Turtle Tracks readers! A new season is upon us and I'm sure you are just as anxious to get out on the trail as I am. I am happy to report that the U.S. Forest Service has multiple projects planned this year to improve the Maah Daah Hey (MDH) Trail System. In this season's update, I'll touch on the upcoming projects involving the USFS, our partners, and our volunteers.

The Forest Service will hire a trail contractor this season to restore the Cottonwood Trail and perform excavation work on two reroutes at mile posts 125.5 and 128 of the Maah Daah Hey National Recreation Trail. Another contractor will be hired to install a low water crossing at Andrew's Creek on the Buffalo Gap Trail. These projects are funded through the Recreation Trails Program Grant in association with the Federal Highway Administration, North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department (NDPRD), and local volunteers. The Sunset Trail is anticipated to be officially opened by season's end. This trail will connect the MDH Trail just north of mile 143 to the Long X Trail at mile 5.20, which will create a two mile loop. CCC West Trailhead is our busiest as many folks utilize the MDH and Long X Trails to create an 11 mile loop. This smaller loop will provide a short hike or ride for those not ready to tackle the larger loop.

Our Dakota Prairie Grasslands Trails Crew is being assembled and has a long list of duties for the 2020 season. Highlighted Trails Crew projects include; trail maintenance & mowing, sign installations, and an additional two kiosks at the CCC East Trailhead. We will also implement a weed spraying program to tackle broadleaf vegetation growth on recently surfaced sections of trail. We ask that trail users report any heavy vegetation growth on surfaced sections of trail.

The USFS will work with our partners on a couple different projects this season. We are putting our Participating Agreement to work again this year with another hitch scheduled with the Montana Conservation Corps (MCC). We are partnering with Theodore Roosevelt National Park to accomplish maintenance tasks on the MDH Trail within the South Unit. MCC will also perform trail maintenance on other sections of the MDH and Buffalo Gap Trails.

The USFS and NDPRD are continuing our partnership project; *Little Missouri National Grasslands Motorized Trail Map*. This map highlights off-highway vehicle (OHV) trails on both the Medora and McKenzie Ranger Districts on the Little Missouri National Grassland and is available for download free of charge through Avenza Maps. Paper copies will soon be available.

I want to thank everyone who volunteered their time and muscle to improve the Maah Daah Hey Trail System last year. We saw a 17% rise in volunteer hours from 2018. There will be many opportunities to volunteer again this season! Some of the projects for 2020 include; trail maintenance, signage, data collection, and gate / fence repair. Please contact your local association or myself directly to get set up.

MDHTA Self Closing Gates Maintenance Project

The Maah Daah Hey Trail has 98 self-closing gates spread across the 144 miles of trail. Most have been in place for 20 + years and are in need of maintenance. Gate spring adjustment to allow gates to close/open properly, leveling, checking support fence posts, replacing bottom gate stop posts, checking welds are some of the issues needing to be addressed on the gates and necessary repairs completed. The Association will be creating a repair/maintenance checklist and will be asking for volunteers to help with this needed trail maintenance item. Trail Notes

Trail conditions can change without notice overnight as they did last fall. We have received several questions on the Maah Daah Hey Trail closure between mile posts 67 and 73. The reason why the trail is closed is the land beneath the trail collapsed near mile 69.5 during the unusually wet fall leaving a 15-20 foot drop off. (See photo.) Inattentive trail users could easily fall into the gully and if not injured, at least have a difficult time getting out of the hole and back up

onto the trail.

The Forest Service currently has plans for a temporary reroute this spring as soon as conditions permit with a permanent reroute to be done later. A photo showing a proposed bypass of the gully can be seen on the next page. Trail users should always be aware that the Maah Daah Hey

trailhead/campground sign-in clipboards, gate maintenance project, checklist from FS for new volunteer groups and list of volunteer projects, MDHTA comment on CCC Campground re-design, feasibility of tree planting volunteer event at campgrounds and trailheads, and to maintain communication with MDHTA on Summit and MDH trail closure bypass, form a Trail User advisory board, update our current FS Memorandum of Understanding if needed, and make recommendations for future RTP projects with the FS.

We received the new **2020** North Dakota Travel Guide and the MDH trail is mentioned on 21 pages out of 132, down a few pages from last year but still a pretty high number for people to look at for an outdoor adventure. 
