### President's Message

#### Hello to trail users:

Winter is slowly losing its hold on us, and some spring is in the air, as we prepare for another great season on the MDH Trail. A *Midwest Living* Magazine article "Best in Show" shows the number one Wellness Bike Trail in the Midwest as the Maah Daah Hey Trail System. Always thrilling to see recognition of the MDHT system.

First, we have to thank our new Life Members, Richard and Lori Brierley, our 41st if my count is correct. Also, Chris Michel from Texas has joined at the Post membership level. We also gained several Individual/Family memberships. Then a big THANK YOU to all our current members for continuing with the mission to Promote and Maintain the Maah Daah Hey Trail system. As you know, we are a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization and all membership donations are tax deductible.

This past fall, The MDHTA completed our 2020 RTP grant from the ND Park and Recreation, that was placing gravel surface on over 2.5 miles of trail in the Sully Creek Park area. We have received many good comments on these segments, with the question "When will more be surfaced???" So, this year we have been successful with two approved 2021 Recreational Trail Program (RTP) grants from the ND State Park and Recreation Department. The projects entail about 5 miles of trail surfacing split between the Coal Creek Campground area and finishing up around the Sully Creek State Park. This will provide trail users with an all-weather trail in these

areas. We will need a lot of volunteer help from all members to complete the 20% share of these RTP Grants. The MDHTA plans to host a workday, with lunch, on June 5<sup>th</sup> (National Trails Day) at Sully Creek State Park Campground if everything works out to do so. A second workday at Coal Creek Campground is being planned for later in the summer. Thanks again to all who volunteered last year to make our project a success, some 61 people showed up and surfaced just short of 1000 feet of trail. It looks like a very busy 2021 on the MDH!!

We received \$1500 in January from the **Roughrider Electric Roundup** committee to put towards these RTP projects, so Thank You to those folks also.

The MDHTA has a great supply of **MDH** merchandize, including medallions, water bottles, patches, caps, T-shirts, etc. Just go to **MDHTA.com**, click on **STORE**, and place your order. We have sold over 50 of the new MDH maps since they were reprinted in November of last year. They have gone all over North Dakota and to many out of state trail users.

Jesse Hanson is directing our 2021 MDH Challenge, so get your mileage accomplishments into him for your badges by the end of the year. See more in Trail Notes in Turtle Tracks. Roger Ashley is heading up the trail signage (some 8.5 miles to go) and trail counter programs with FS this year. So contact Roger if you would like to help with these tasks and see some of the trail you may not have seen yet. The area that needs signage is on the north end of the MDH.

### **Annual Meeting Program**

Trail reports from the organizations that support the Maah Daah Hey Trail System will be given. An election of three directors for the MDHTA Board will also be conducted.

### **Trail Notes**

### Trails Day - June 5 - Hold the Date!

Trails Day 2021 will headquartered at the Sully Creek State Park south of Medora on Saturday, June 5. Please hold this date on your calendar. A time schedule will be sent out later as we approach this date. During the day, volunteers will be surfacing the trail with gravel south of the State Park to repair wear and erosion of the trail's tread. A lunch will be served. In 2020 it was estimated that between 4,000 and 6,000 used the trail between Bully Pulpit and Sully Creek from April through October. The labor volunteers provide will be used as part of the match required by the RTP project coordinated by MDHTA. Many hands make light work!




### TR Presidential Library and the MDHT

Congress instructed the Secretary of Agriculture acting through the Chief of the Forest Service under Title XVIII - Theodore Roosevelt Presidential Library Conveyance Act of 2020 to convey 93 acres of land to the Theodore Roosevelt Presidential Library Foundation. A portion of the trail runs through the southwest corner of that property. Terms or Conditions of the conveyance include an easement for the Maah Daah Hey National Recreation Trail and US Forest Service Road #7371 which is retained by the United States. This means the Forest Service will still have access to maintain the trail through the property used by thousands of people every year. The topography near the trail along with the design of the building may reduce the visual impact that the library site will have.

## Trails of the North Dakota Badlands & Prairie – New Trail Guide 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition

The old trail guide authored by **Hiram Rogers**, a Life member of MDHTA, has been out of print for a number of years. Curt scoured the country for copies but finally ran out of reasonably priced books for MDHTA to sell. The book appeared to become a collector's item based on the price people were asking. In addition to attending the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Maah Daah Hey Trail, Hiram was hiking the trail and working on the revised edition to include the



added 48 miles of MDHT and expanding the coverage of Ice Caves and Cottonwood-Bennett - Maah Daah Hey loop. MDHTA ordered copies of Trails of North Dakota Badlands & Prairie A Guide to the Maah Daah Hey Trail Theodore Roosevelt National Park, & Dakota Prairie Grasslands that ar now available for purchase at the Store on MDHTA.COM or come to the Annual Meeting on April 24.

### **Update on Bench Project**

The last two benches at trailheads will be placed at Bennett and CCC later this spring. The project began with a suggestion by **Bruce Bishop**, former director of MDHTA, to place benches at trailheads so people could change their shoes, rest, or have a place to wait for a ride. The project

#### 2021 RTP Grants

The MDHTA received notice that proposed resurfacing projects near Sully Creek and Coal Creek were approved for construction recently. These grants administered by the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department provide significant support to accomplish the goal of repairing gullies in the trail and reducing impact from increased use. The combined estimated cost of both projects is \$145,000 with

MDHTA expected to pick up \$29,000 of this total. Much of the cost to MDHTA will be from the volunteer labor provided during workdays scheduled for this summer. Volunteers have been the backbone of the organization and continue to demonstrate the desire to provide a world class experience for trail users.

### **Trail Registers**

Self-registration at trailheads help identify high use areas to target maintenance and other management practices in addition to providing information to support grant applications. This past year we found about only one in twenty trail users signed in at the trail registers. The next time you use a trail please sign in. Individual names are not collected at Forest Service registers and as long as you are not the only one living in town you can't be identified. If you are interested, the four most popular trailheads according to 2020 trailhead registration were CCC, Magpie, Ice Caves, and Sully Creek.

### 2021 Trail Challenge

The Maah Daah Hey Trail Association is challenging trail users to participate in the 2021 Trail Challenge. Anyone who

hikes, bikes or rides a horse 25, 50, 100 or 150 miles on the Maah Daah Hey Trail or on any of its affiliated trails (Buffalo Gap, Long X, Wolf, Aspen Bennett, Cottonwood, and/or Summit) during the calendar year 2021 in aggregate or all at once, will be eligible for a patch. We encourage participants to post their pictures and their stories to the Facebook page or send them to the MDHTA so they can be posted in the MDHTA website.

### Logo Sign Project

Only 8 ½ miles of logo signs need to be placed on marker posts between MP 121 and 129 ½. Mark Zimmerman and Glee Mayer are raring to go as well as Pat and Roger Ashley. This is a nice day hike though camping at Bennett is close by. This may be the most challenging part of the trail in terms of distance from road to where we can start attaching signs but it can be a great family outing. If the weather cooperates we would like to hang April 17 and 18. 


## Report Trail Maintenance Needs

Since the trail runs through and on top of some of the most unstable soils found in western North Dakota there will be occasional slumps, collapses, and other failures in the trail. The Forest Service tries to keep the trail passable and in excellent shape for all users but finding these problems before trail users do is an impossible task. Rather than grousing about why a problem isn't fixed, probably because it hasn't been reported, trail users can go to MDHTA.COM, click on the "Contact" tab, and then click on the red printed text, "trail upkeep form." A direct link to this form is <a href="http://mdhta.com/trail-upkeep/">http://mdhta.com/trail-upkeep/</a>. Using this form reports trail

problems directly to the Forest Service and MDHTA. Please keep in mind you will need to provide as accurate a note as to where the problem is and the problem encountered as possible. If you have GPS coordinates, that's ideal but a Mile Post number nearest the problem will suffice. The user can also attach a photo (a picture is worth a 1,000 words) of the problem area. A written description of the problem will help. Be sure to include your name and email address in the spaces provided in case there are any questions. If you want to include your phone number put that in the space where you describe the problem.


